This year's iGen students met up with Sherbrooke Elders on the yellow brick road and took a trip to the Emerald City. The Grade Six Saskatoon Public School class spends their school year co-located at Sherbrooke Community Centre and their home school, and enjoys experiential learning with Elders.

The iGen class put on a musical production of *The Wizard of Oz* for three sold-out audiences this May in the Tawâw Centre. Students and Elders engaged the audience with fantastic songs and performances.

Sherbrooke Elder J.P. Ducasse was the voice actor for the Wizard. He shared that working with the students made him feel young again.

"I think there is an actor or actress in every single one of us, and we all have to remember that we were kids once. As kids, we all played make believe and that's so very important in our day and age when there are so many challenging things happening in the world today," said Ducasse.

The musical raised funds for the students' annual camping trip to Pike Lake Provincial Park. Students and Elders had just a few

weeks to memorize their lines, build sets, and learn choreography.

Caelyn Karras played the role of the Tin Man and loved getting into character on stage.

"I got to play with a lot of props which I liked a lot. Especially the ax. I got to do so many things with it."

The Wizard of Oz is full of eclectic and unique characters, providing many opportunities for Elders to play roles. Some Elders played crows that hovered around the Tin Man, while others played the Winged Monkeys under the control of the Wicked Witch of the West.

Andrew Glendenning was one of the iGen students who joined Elders in playing a Winged Monkey. He loved performing alongside Elders.

"I had so much fun but I'm not sure how I was able to get into character. I just did it. I just put a scarf on and flapped around," said Glendenning.

This year's class was an energetic and very theatrical group of students who did a wonderful job of connecting with Elders on a personal level.

For Ducasse, who helped teach science to the students throughout the year, the iGen program represents hope for the future.

"These iGen students are our future. I think all of our energies have to be put into the

future generations because, as adults, we've kind of screwed things up. The kids of the future have to fix our mistakes."

STORIES OF A LIFETIME

Every person has a story. For a group of Sherbrooke residents, the ability to express their own stories was made possible through a unique partnership with a local theatre company.

Stories of a Lifetime was a collaboration between Sherbrooke and Saskatoon's Gordon Tootoosis Nīkānīwin Theatre company (GTNT) that celebrated the stories and creativity of 10 Sherbrooke residents. The project was led by local artist Lautaro Reyes; Sherbrooke's Artist-in-Residence, Alana Moore; and Sherbrooke's Recreation team.

Reyes and GTNT approached Sherbrooke in late 2024 with the idea of empowering residents to share their stories in different and creative ways. It was an idea born from Reyes' love for his grandmother.

"My grandmother was a really interesting woman," explained Reyes. "She would tell me stories when we would travel. However, when I saw her with family, she was really quiet. Almost like she was playing a character. She was not the person that she was with me. It got me thinking of how many seniors have stories to share but they don't because they are playing a character."

Reyes, Moore and Sherbrooke's Recreation team worked with a group of 10 residents for three months in a variety of different workshops. Residents spent time learning about theatre and how to express themselves on stage. They made collages showing various passions in their lives. Residents also worked together to compose a spoken-word poem and explored the benefits of yoga and meditative breathing.

Ricardo Henriquez was one of the residents who took part in these workshops. He loved taking part in all the different activities.

"We started with poetry and working on our breathing skills. Then we did some spoken word and that's when more and more people got involved," said Henriquez.

For Alana Moore, this project gave her the opportunity to work with residents in new ways.

"As the Artist-in-Residence, I am working a lot with visual art, but I was really excited for the opportunity to work with theatre artists and a local poet. Bringing in all of these different mediums has been something really unique."


Moore also noted that inviting various local artists to work on this project gave residents a chance to truly be themselves.

"Residents having the opportunity to share their stories and share who they are really authentically through a series of workshops was really special. We were able to just slow down and really hear and listen to each other."

Stories of a Lifetime culminated in the Tawâw Centre with a special performance of a residents' poem. A documentary film followed, where residents shared stories and advice for future generations.

TAWÂW CENTRE: A GATHERING PLACE

The Tawâw Centre is a place where our Sherbrooke community gathers to connect with each other through music, entertainment, education, and the always dramatic Saskatchewan Roughrider football games.

This year, the Tawâw Centre has hosted several unique gatherings. In January, the second annual "Sherbrooke's Got Talent" took place with a packed audience and four very stringent judges. The audience was treated to 15 performances ranging from dance to piano to guitar-to

a riveting spoken word performance. It takes courage to perform in front of an audience; our audience was grateful to the Elders, staff and family members who shared their talents.

In March, the Tawâw Centre hosted a live performance of Luna. The play was a production of Saskatoon's 25th Street Theatre Company, written and directed by Saskatoon playwright Danielle Roy. It tells the story of a young girl who

builds a time machine to go back and save her mother. The performance was a dress rehearsal before the play continued to 14 different communities across Saskatchewan. This allowed Elders to see the cast and crew set up the stage beforehand, and afterwards to discuss what worked and what needed to be changed. It was a fun glimpse in the creative process and we are grateful the 25th Street Theatre Company chose us for their dress rehearsal.

The Tawâw Centre hosted our first

for recreation programming. The auction was a hit with Elders, staff and families bidding on more than 60 donated items. Professional auctioneer Treyton Wolfe brought turbocharged wordsmithing and his fun style of engaging with bidders. Over \$4,500 was raised to provide meaningful and fun programming for Elders. A big thank you to everyone who contributed items, and everyone who raised their paddles to place a bid during the auction.

MY TIME AT SHERBROOKE

My name is Arin Bear, and I have just finished my B.A. Honours degree in English at the University of Saskatchewan. From January to April 2025, I did an internship at Sherbrooke Community Centre. I was drawn to doing an internship at Sherbrooke because I was familiar with the Eden Alternative® philosophy and Elder-directed care. Autonomy

and respect for an individual is important to me, so I am incredibly grateful to have been able to be a part of the daily lives of Elders and involved with the Eden Alternative® at Sherbrooke. Everyone at Sherbrooke is unique—including staff and visitors—so seeing and being part of the community was a wonderful learning and teaching experience.

In the storytelling project I did with the Elders at Sherbrooke, I listened to stories from Elders and discovered how the things we share with others represent little pieces of ourselves. Elders shared many different types of stories, and I am thankful for each one. These stories really taught me

the value in storytelling as a way of connecting with others, as well as the importance of careful listening. experienced many relaxed mornings when I sat with Elders, drank coffee, and talked. I learned to value those easy and small moments. As a university student, there's a culture of constant work and go-go-go, but being at Sherbrooke reminded me of the value in unhurried, easy mornings.

I hope Elders found value in the storytelling project, as well. I hope I was able to not only be taught,

but maybe help others realize the value and importance of their own stories, and of sharing what's important to them. I really do hope I was also able to bring some smiles and company for the time I was around! I have truly appreciated the time I had at Sherbrooke and felt like I made genuine connections and friendships, and I hope others feel similarly. Sherbrooke is a place of community that makes and holds space for the people who live, work, and visit there. I will remember the stories I was told and the people I was with for a very long time, and I'm so thankful for everyone I was able to meet at Sherbrooke.
